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tween the Neo-Babylonian Chronicle Series and the Ptolemaic Canon as far as content is concerned. The only evident similarities are that both documents begin their list of Babylonian kings with Nabu-nasir and both documents use the same short form of Nahunadin-zeri's name. 25 The fact that the Ptolemaie Canon omits Nabu-shuma-ukin II; 26 uses the Babylonian name of Shalmaneser V

There is little evidence of a connection be-

while the series uses his Assyrian name;27 does not recognize the rule in Babylonia of Sargon as the series does;28 and reckons the number of years of the interregnum before Esarhaddon and the number of Esarhaddon's regnal years differently from the series29 shows that the source or sources used by Ptolemy certainly had a different point of view from the author of the series.
