# INTRODUCTION

An edition of legal texts<sup>1</sup> originating in the reign of Assurbanipal through Sin-šarru-iškun is faced with the problem of the sequence of the post-canonical eponyms, a question on which no consensus has been reached.

The provisional dates assigned by M. Falkner, "Die Eponymen der spätassyrischen Zeit," have been used widely since the publication of her valuable article in 1954-56. The new evidence that had become available by the mid 1990's was collected and evaluated by R.M. Whiting in his chapter "The Post-canonical and Extra-canonical Eponyms" in Millard, *The Eponyms of the Assyrian Empire 910-612 BC*, SAAS 2 (1994) 72-78.

Recently two different lists of the post-canonical eponyms prepared independently have appeared in print: "Assyrian eponyms, kings and pretenders, 648-605 BC" by J.E. Reade in Or. 67 (1998) 255-265, and S. Parpola's reconstruction of the eponym order as given in the introduction to K. Radner (ed.), The Prosopography of the Neo-Assyrian Empire 1/I (1998) xviii-xx.

The documents of Kakkullanu edited in this volume have had a central role in the study of post-canonical eponyms. Kakkullanu's documents form a tightly knit group in which the same witnesses often appear, and importantly, mostly with their titles. The frequent mention of titles has invited scholars to attempt to solve the question of the post-canonical eponym sequence by studying the careers of these witnesses.

# The Crown Prince's Establishment

## Central Persons

From the central people in the documents of the present volume the officials belonging to the establishment of the crown prince  $(m\bar{a}r\ \check{s}arri)^8$  emerge as the most significant. As can be seen from Table I the officials of the crown prince form the most important single group and comprise 17% of all the documents in which the central person is known.

Best known are the cohort commanders of the crown prince whose documents were most probably found in Room C of the North Palace, i.e. of the Succession Palace (bēt rēdûti). Two tablets, K 309A (no. 29) of Kişir-Aššur and K 329 (no. 39) of Kakkullanu, can in fact be identified as having been found in Room C.<sup>a</sup>

The foremost individual dossier is that of Kakkullanu, cohort commander of the crown prince, whose 25 documents date to the years 630\*-617\*. Only the dossiers of two royal charioteers. Sennacherib's charioteer Šumma-ilani (23 documents) and that of Assurbanipal's charioteer Remanni-Adad (55 documents) can match or exceed this number. 10

# Kakkullanu

From the documents of Kakkullanu we learn among other things that he owned a house in Nineveh, and in 630\* he extended this house by buying a "toolshed" (bīt akkulli) measuring 43×25 cubits (c. 250m²!)11, next to his house. The outbuilding included a well and bordered the house of Il-mananî, horse trainer, and two streets (no. 35). The size of the "toolshed" is impressive, but judging by the high sale price, three minas and 30 shekels of silver, and by the fact that the measurements are given at all, we have no reason to doubt that it is correct. The translation "toolshed" obviously does not convey the full meaning of this word, and the translation outbuilding is used here. 12

In 625\* Kakkullanu further extended his property, possibly the same house as in 630\*, with the purchase of the neighbouring house from Šarru-lu-dari, horse trainer of the chief eunuch of the crown prince. For the fully built house with its roof beams, six doors, a well and a barn (talpittu) he paid two minas of silver (no. 40).

In 617\* he bought another house with four doors for half a mina of silver in SAG URU.NINA.KI (no. 47). If our view of the order of the post-canonical eponyms is correct, this cannot be his original house. Nos. 53 and 54 may be yet further house purchases of Kakkullanu.

Outside Nineveh Kakkullanu owned landed property in several locations. His largest holdings were in Bit-Abu-ila'i where Kakkullanu acquired in all 25.5 hectares in 29 plots during the years 625\*-623\* (nos. 42, 44 and 45). Out of this total 5.5 hectares were leased. In fact we know that he must have owned more land than this in the area, because none of the known documents represent his first purchase there, the acquired plots being always situated next to an existing property of his. Neighbours in Bit-Abu-ila'i include the cohort commanders Kişir-Aššur and Ubru-Nabû. Unfortunately Bit-Abu-ila'i is attested only in the Kakkullanu documents and its exact geographical location is not known.<sup>13</sup>

In Qurubi, also of unknown location, Kakkullanu leased 20 hectares in at least four separate plots, a house, a threshing floor, orchard, meadow, and a well in 625\* (no. 41). Near the village of Tab[...] he purchased land for half a mina of silver in 624\* (no. 43).

In addition, Kakkullanu owned vineyards in Appuni and Irbu. In Irbu he acquired a complete vineyard with two persons for three minas of silver (no. 36). In Appuni he extended his garden by buying an adjacent vineyard for 1.5 minas of silver (no. 46).

A special feature of Kakkullanu's slave purchases is that he buys women as wives for three of his servants, for Tarhunazi (no. 34), for Ululayu (no. 37) and for Urdu-Nabû (no. 38).

In all Kakkullanu acquired, in addition to several houses in Nineveh, 45.5 hectares in 33 plots in at least 5 different locations, a garden, two vineyards and several slaves. Silver involved in the known transactions amounts to 17.5 minas 21 shekels. The phrasing of the contravention clause used in his purchase documents tells us that Kakkullanu was not a eunuch.
